ELECTIONS AND EMS LEVY VOTE

On November 6, 2007 you will be asked to vote on whether or not Spokane County Fire District 5 (FD5) should collect .50 cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation each year beginning in 2007 to be collected in 2008 and each year after to maintain the level of Emergency Medical Services (EMS). This fact sheet will answer many questions you may have in order to make an informed and educated decision on November 6, 2007. Information regarding two commissioner position elections can be found in the Voter's Pamphlet or online: google Spokane County Elections, choose "Online Voters Guide" then "View Candidates" and follow pull down menu to Fire District 5 Candidates.

What taxes am I currently paying for Fire District services? You pay \$1.10/\$1,000 assessed value; that tax money is collected for fire services, not EMS services though we have spread the revenue out for both fire and EMS for years. FD5 has the lowest rate out of all 11 fire districts in Spokane County. And other than Fire District 3 (Cheney), we are the *only* district that does not already have a separate levy or bond to supplement revenue in maintaining the district's operations or EMS program.

What kind of services does FD5 provide to me? We currently provide fire protection and emergency medical services to approximately 2,000 residents over 90 square miles. We respond to approximately 70 emergency calls per year with over 60% of those being EMS calls.

What resources does FD5 use to respond to emergency medical calls? (1)We currently have 3 vehicles that meet state standards for Basic Life Support (BLS). They all carry necessary emergency supplies including an automatic emergency defibrillator. They are located in three different places, one in each of our two stations and one with the lead responder to ensure better response coverage over our large area. One vehicle is strictly an emergency rig purchased new in 2004. (2)We have 23 volunteers, 16 of them are also Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's). They have successfully completed a Basic EMT course and attend ongoing training monthly with other fire districts to keep up on their skills and learn new ones.


FD5 also conducts hands-on training a minimum of two times per month. The most important part of our team is our volunteers; they give a very precious commodity... *time*. Each volunteer trains and is equipped with personal protective gear required by national safety codes as well as a pager and radio. (3) We also have Automatic Mutual Aid Agreements with all of our neighboring fire districts and ambulance services. That means that when you call 9-1-1, one or more of these neighboring districts are also automatically paged/alerted and are responding to the call until our crew cancels them. Most of these districts have full-time career emergency staff. Bottom line is...help is always on the way.

So if FD5 has established good response, good coverage, and great resources on my taxes so far, why do they need more money? Tax revenue resources have dropped in recent years; I-695 regarding motor vehicle excise tax and I-747 capping property tax increases to 1% have cost the state almost 2 billion dollars annually; that meant cuts to many resources including fire districts in all counties. Fuel, insurance, and communication bills have increased. We are expected to provide the same or better services with less revenue. It has cost a lot of money to get us to this level of service. We need help in order to maintain that service; it is simply not possible without it.

THESE ARE THE FACTS:

In the last three years (since 2004)to present:

- Our average number of volunteers has increased from 17 to 23.
- Our average number of Emergency Medical Technicians has increased from 4 to 16.
- The percentage of EMS calls has increased from 31% to 62%.
- Our average response time *just for EMS calls* has *dropped* from 18.62 minutes to 11.66 minutes.
- Our equipped and available EMS vehicles has increased from 1 to 3.
- Our Firefighter training has increased from 1 to a minimum of 2 times a month; the EMT training increased from 1 to 3 times a month including training with our neighboring districts.

Burning INFormation

FOR YARD AND GARDEN DEBRIS BURNING

- Yard and garden waste may be burned with no permit required on Friday through Monday the first two weekends in April only (8 days total) unless otherwise posted. -OR-
- Yard and garden waste may be burned by purchasing a permit from Spokane County Fire District #5. The permit costs \$25.00 and is good for **one calendar year.** It allows *you* to choose which 8 days to burn during the year. Call 796-4793 for further information.
- NOTE: You must <u>always</u> call the day you plan to burn for clearance whether you have a permit or not. Call SCAPCA at 477-4710 <u>and</u> this fire district at 796-4793.

FOR FOREST DEBRIS (SLASH)

Burning in undeveloped forest areas is delegated by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources. In forested areas protected by DNR, debris burning is permitted without a written permit if <u>all</u> of these conditions are met:

- **Burn one pile at a time** of forest debris that is less than 4 feet in diameter at any time of the year.
- Burn only natural vegetation or untreated wood

products.

- Burn piles are at least 50 feet from structures and 500 feet from any forest slash.
- **Clear the area** around the burn pile of any flammable material.
- The winds are calm or light. It is too windy to burn if trees are swaying, flags are extended, or waves appear on open water.
- **Maintain a connected water hose** or at least five gallons of water and a shovel nearby.
- **Attend the fire** until it is completely extinguished.
- **Be prepared to extinguish the fire** if it becomes a nuisance.
- **Call 1-800-323-BURN and 477-4710** to obtain updated burning information on the day of the burn.

If any of these conditions cannot be met, a written DNR burning permit is required.

To obtain a DNR burning permit call 1-800-527-3305 at least a week before you plan to burn.
